DETROIT HAS HARD LUCK AND

LOSES TO YANKEE

Heavy Swell Running at Venice Scars

Folsom and Two Others Out

of Staying—Pugh

Is Game

Columbine, Yankee and Myth were the winners of the Venice regatta, Columbine taking three, one race from Mischief II and one each from Monsoon and Detroit.

Detroit played in hard luck all day yesterday. In the first race, after a poor start, she outsailed Yankee in the first half and then lost the race through her throat halyards giving way. On the

cruising race home from Venice in the afternoon she started fully two minutes ahead of Columbine and finished six minutes ahead of her, but the latter wins on time allowance.

Yankee and Myth won their first races of the season, Yankee from Detroit after a close race, and Myth from Columbine after a heavy swell began to roll. It didn't last long after the ebb tide got to running and all the boats which stayed

near the shore were blown down the beach by the tug Redondo, went to a mooring well outside of the breakwater and had no further trouble. She leaks a little, considering the heavy pounding she got.

When it was found yesterday morning that there could be no race in B class because Folsom had taken Mischief home, the regatta committee decided to start on time. Through a slight misunderstanding a preparatory gun was fired at the time that A and B classes should have started, though all the larger boats had been notified of the change in time. The consequence was that Yankee got close to the line, while Detroit stood off to leeward; so when the starting signal was fired five minutes later Yankee got away two and a half minutes before Columbine.

The course was two and a half miles to windward and leeward, twice around, and in the reach up to North Santa Monica Detroit easily overhauled Yankee, passing her just before the first mark was turned. With his tiller in hand, Pugh got under way in time to start at 11:25, and Monsoon and Columbine crossed the line together, with the Mitchell boat to windward. Columbine at once drew away, the light air from the sea being as good as a head wind for her.

The D class boats were far up the beach by this time, with Osborn of C class sailing over the course alone. Whitely in Columbine was not urging his boat very much, even after turning right mark he did not set any light sails, willing to give Monsoon all possible chance to win.

The latter was loggy with water, though, and could not sail in anything like her real form. After Pugh got under start it was seen that she would not win. Pugh was game all the way through, and kept his crippled boat in the race to the finish. Only once did the wind favor him, and in the second half of the race he was nearly becalmed near the flag. Monsoon got a favorable puff and gained for a few minutes.

Densham Not Asleep
Detroit, after rounding the flag at the breakwater after the first half, stood out to sea in search of more wind. Densham, not to be taken napping, followed her when he saw her start. When about two miles off shore, Detroit's throat halyard parted and Dodge had to throw her up into the wind. Yankee soon passed her, and held the lead to the finish.

Columbine finished first at 1:08:05; Yankee, 1:13:21; Monsoon, 1:18:10; Osborn, 1:17; Detroit, 1:19:07; Myth, 1:25:50; Hilda, 1:42:07; Portland, 1:47:03.

The regatta committee decided to allow Detroit the time lost starting for it. It was no fault of Capt. Dodge, but it would make no difference in the finish.

Most of the smaller boats started for home without waiting for the cruising race, which started promptly at 1:30. Columbine was first to get away, nearly three minutes ahead of the fleet, Monsoon next, followed closely by Detroit, while Yankee was delayed four minutes more in taking the start.

Detroit sailed a fine race again, overhauling Columbine off Redondo. Capt. Engeström of Yankee sought to overtake her, but was promptly stopped by the shore, but the wind failed and he never got within hailing distance of them.

Off the San Diego breakwater Monsoon's tiller gave out and she narrowly escaped being blown down the beach. Captain Dodge managed to work her into the outer harbor with her jib, when the launch Audrey came along and took her in tow.

Detroit finished at 6:51:30, Columbine, 6:56:45; Yankee, 7:09:21, and Monsoon at 7:28:14.

In time allowance Columbine wins, making a total of three cups she adds to her list of trophies for this season.

The Venice trophies will be formally presented at the shipyard by Cabrillo at a date to be decided upon later by the regatta committee.

In spite of the many mishaps on the cruise the tars had a fine time, and the annual visit to the beach resorts will go down as one of the most eventful in the club's history.

It is gratifying to learn at this late hour that Abbot Kinney has ordered all bills incident to the stranding of the Monsoon sent to him, he feeling it was his duty for the visiting yachts and wishing to do everything to make their trip enjoyable.

Monsoon will be hauled out today and her whole interior thoroughly inspected.
